Liunoras Honored for "Life-Saving Efforts"

I gnacio Liunoras was recently honored for helping save the life of a heart attack victim in The Villages, FL, shortly before Christmas in 2012.

Ignacio and his friend Tony Truax took turns performing CPR within seconds of the cardiac arrest of Mark Panigoni, an assistant basketball coach at The Villages Charter School as they waited for the 911-dispatched public safety crew to arrive. Their fast-acting CPR response was credited for preventing a much worse outcome for Panigoni who after a brief hospital stay was able to spend Christmas at home with his family.

Ignacio and Tony as well as the Public Safety response crew were officially recognized by The Villages Public Safety Department (PSD)
during the Village Center

Development
District monthly
board meeting
on January 17,
2013. Signed by

the PSD Fire Chief, Michael Tucker, Ignacio's citation plaque reads "The Villages Public Safety Department hereby recognizes with grateful appreciation the lifesaving efforts of Ignacio Liunoras for his assistance in the successful resuscitation of a nonresponstive patient on December, 19 2012."

Being a Volunteer Is an Enriching Experience

How did I get into volume ing? Well, I wanted to find a good activity that not only made me feel better but also allowed me to give something back to others outside the sphere of my family, friends, and work. As a child, I witnessed my mother's generosity as she helped and gave time to others. My goal was to do something positive and good for others like she did.

I decided to sign up for the then Baptist Hospital's Friends of the Hospice in the Midlands program training class in 1993. This program helps patients diagnosed with terminal illness who don't seek active treatment anymore and also provides assistance to their families. The aim is to provide palliative care for patients and help family members so that the final days of the loved one are comfortable and dignified. I've

given over 2,000 hours for the Hospice program, but I've known many extraordinary volunteers that have done plenty and have given much more.

As a volunteer since 1993, my experiences have run the whole gamut from welcoming new patients to celebrating their lives after they pass away. I participate in welcoming patients by delivering what we call a "Love Bag;" a white bag topped with blue tissue that contains items which they can use. I've sat with patients in order for the caregiver, usually a family member, to get a break and allow him/her to do things for him/ herself. Visiting patients might mean keeping them company, reading to them, hearing them share their life stories, or simply a quiet time listening to their favorite music with them.

Palmetto Health Baptist is a non-profit organization, and I've helped in some fund-raising activities such as Lights for the Hospice. There have been instances in the past in which I came into the lives of families after their loved one had passed away --conducting a bereavement visit which focuses on the grieving process for the ones left behind. The hospice conducts a bimonthly memorial service to honor the memories of those who passed away, an activity that I am currently participating in since I don't have an assigned patient right now.

One program that I also hold close to my heart is the Brett's Rainbow Bereavement Camp. This camp is free and helps children who lose love ones deal with their grieving. This program used to be done over a two-day weekend, and I started volunteering in this program after I became a hospice volunteer. It allowed me then to help by staying out of town overnight, sleeping with a group of children at night, and participating in some of their activities during the day. For a long time now, this yearly event has been done in just a single day. I started volunteering for this camp before I had my daughters, but I continued with it while I was pregnant and after they were in strollers. Now, they join me in volunteering when their school activities permit it.

It means so much to me to (continued on Page 5) I first heard the following Tagalog riddle as a little girl in the Philippines: "May isang prinsesa, nakaupo sa tasa." This literally means "There is a princess who sits on a cup." The answer to the riddle is KA-SOY (cashew). I didn't fully understand what the riddle meant and just accepted the answer by faith until I finally saw a cashew tree in Palawan many years later.

The cashew is inside the kidney-shaped shell, called the drupe, which grows on the heart-shaped fruit known as the cashew apple. The drupe is the true fruit, while the cashew apple is the false/accessory fruit of the cashew tree. If you turn the picture upside down, you can imagine the drupe as a little princess sitting on a cup in the form of the cashew apple.

The cashew tree's scientific name is *Anacardium occidentale* where *ana* means "upwards" and *cardium* means "heart." These terms describe an inverted heart, which is the shape of the cashew apple.


Possible Allergen

Although the riddle likens the cashew to a princess, raw cashews actually have the urushiol toxin, which is also found in poison ivy, poison oak, and poison sumac. Urushiol is an oil produced by the plant to protect itself and is found on the outside of the plant.

In the United States, the natural cashew sold in stores has actually been steamed to deactivate or neutralize urushiol. It is important to quickly wash with soap and water areas on the body that might have been exposed to urushiol within minutes of exposure. All items exposed to the sap should also be washed.

Not everyone reacts to urushiol, but allergic reactions can be very extreme (severe itching, redness, swelling and then blisters) once the toxin has been absorbed by the skin.

Urushiol can also be inhaled when the plant is burnt.

People with known sensitivities to poison ivy and other plants that have urushiol should be careful around cashew trees and cautiously eat cashews until they know how they will react to them. Ingesting large amounts of urushiol can also be fatal although cashew poisoning is rare.

Cashew Capital

You might know about the relatively recent international spotlight on Palawan due to "The Bourne Legacy" movie, which was filmed there in February 2012. Palawan is also known as the cashew capital of the Philippines, which hasn't always been the case.

In 2004, around 60,000 acres in Palawan were dedicated to cashew plantation as part of the One Town One Product (OTOP) project. This versatile tree can now be found in every municipality in Palawan and thrives in heavy rainfall and in hot draught conditions. It is able to adapt to different soil types where other crops may not thrive. During my trips to Palawan I always bought several pounds of the freshest cashews I've ever tasted.

The cashew tree is actually native to Brazil but was brought to the Philippines during the 17th century. There was

a time when the Philippines did not have the mechanical technology to harvest the cashews from the drupes. The harvests were instead exported to China for processing and the Philippines would import cashews into the country. So much more is now known about the cashew tree and no part of this tree goes to waste.

"No Part Goes to Waste"

The evergreen cashew tree itself is good for reforestation due to its ability to thrive under different conditions. It grows to a height of 33-40 feet with an irregularly shaped-trunk and a small domed-shaped crown or canopy.

Its wood has been used to build boats and rafts. Its bark can help sore gums and tooth aches. Its leaves can help cure burns, skin ailments, and stomach disorders, while younger leaves can be eaten raw in salads.

Two to three years after planting, the cashew trees start to bear fruit. Full bearing occurs in 10 to 15 years and continues for at least another 20 years. The tree can live up to

30 to 40 years. In the Philippines, the trees bear flowers from November to March. Harvesting starts in February, peaks in May and can last until June.

The young cashew apple is green or purple and becomes completely yellow or red as it ripens and becomes ready for harvesting. The cashew apple gets larger, heavier, softer, and juicer as it matures. The cashew apple falls to the ground when it is ripe. It can be eaten raw or used to make jam, chutney, wine, and other beverages.

The drupe is green and hard when young. The nuts can be harvested when the drupe is ash gray in color.

Cashews are a good source of certain nutrients. The cashew nut and kernel are known to be nerve tonics and stimulants, among other things. The nut meat can be used as antidotes for irritant poisons. The cashew nut shell liquid (CNSL) has been used to treat leprosy, elephantiasis, psoriasis, warts, and corn and cracks in the soles of feet. The roots of the tree have purgative properties.

Sans Rival

I particularly like cashews because it is also an important ingredient in the *sans rival* (meaning *without rival*) cake, a very popular dessert in the Philippines.

In the 1920s to 30s, many Filipinos went overseas to study. A number went to France and brought back French cooking techniques.

Sans rival cake is made with layers of meringue (dacquoise) prepared with crushed cashews that are then baked till crispy. Buttercream frosting is placed in between layers.

Columbia Fil-Am ELECTION Primer

VOTERS

- ➤ A paid member can cast one vote during the election. Under the By-laws, those with family memberships are allowed two votes per family.
- A qualified voter who cannot be physically present during the election may cast a vote via a **proxy**. He/she should notify the Election Committee (ELECOM) **before noon of March 31** regarding the proxy who will vote in and for his/ her behalf.

ELECOM

The Election Committee (ELECOM) supervises the conduct of the election. The ELECOM is empowered to promulgate rules and regulations governing elections.

VOTE

➤ ELECOM members and their immediate families are **not** eligible to run for any elective office.

CANDIDATES

- ➤ A candidate for any elective position must be a paid member prior to election, and must be present during the election **OR** if he/she cannot be present, must inform the ELECOM of his/her intention to serve if elected. This ensures that only those willing to accept nomination and election can be voted for.
- ➤ Although different members of the same family can be nominated for one or more positions, only one member from the same family can hold an elective office during the 2013-2015 term.
- ➤ Under the three-term limit set in the By-laws, all the incumbent officers are still eligible for reelection to their respective present positions, if they so wish.
- ➤ Nominations will be finalized just before the actual voting on March 31.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- ➤ The PRESIDENT is the executive officer of the Association. The President presides at all general meetings and Executive Board meetings, call special sessions of the Executive Board, appoint committees, act on behalf of the Association at community functions, report to the general membership all actions taken by the President, other officers, or the Executive Board, and have general supervision responsibilities over all matters pertaining to the organization.
- ➤ The FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT assists the President especially in external affairs and act as President in the absence or incapacity

of the President.

- ▶ The SECOND VICE-PRESI-DENT is in charge of disseminating information regarding membership, seeking new members, and assuring that adequate provisions are made to assure that social functions and meetings have whatever facilities and supplies are necessary. The Second Vice-President also coordinates the standing and special projects committees.
- ➤ The SECRETARY keeps minutes of all meetings of the Executive Board, notify and/or send out meeting notices to members of the Executive Board meetings, and reads the minutes of previous meetings. The Executive Secretary attends to all Association correspondence and maintain custody of correspondence files and the originals of all other documents/papers of the Association.
- ➤ The ASSISTANT SECRETARY keeps minutes of all general membership meetings and notifies and/ or sends out meeting notices to members of the Association. The Assistant Secretary keeps an accurate roster of all members and a list of all standing and special projects committees.
- ➤ The TREASURER keeps the financial records of the Association's accounts, receives and issues receipts for Association monies, dues, and contributions, pays all bills of the Association as properly authorized and retains proper vouchers for all disbursements. In coordination with the President, the Treasurer insures that annual income tax returns and license requirements are properly prepared and submitted on time to the appropriate governmental agencies.
- ➤ The ASSISTANT TREASUR-ER assists the Treasurer and act as Treasurer in the absence of the Treasurer. The Assistant Treasurer serves as the Association Property Custodian and has control of all properties and equipment of the Association.
- ▶ Each of the five **EXECUTIVE BOARD MEMBERS** can be appointed by the President to assist another officer and/or to serve as chairperson of a standing or special projects committee. When deemed necessary by the Executive Board, a Board member elected at-large may also serve as a temporary replacement officer.
