# Columbia Fil-Am Annual Gala To Benefit Philippine Calamity Victims

The Filipino-American Association of Greater Columbia (FAAGC) will hold its 18th Annual Gala on Saturday, September 13, 2008 at the Embassy Suites Hotel from 6:00 p.m. to midnight. The venue is at 200 Stoneridge Drive, Columbia, SC 29210 (just off the Greystone Blvd/Riverbanks Zoo exit of I-126).

The formal dinner-dance gala is the Association's main annual fundraiser to support its various activities such as the Philippine cultural dance troupe, scholarship fund, charitable endeavors, and other educational and multi-cultural activities in the South Carolina Midlands.

#### **Fundraiser for the Red Cross**

This year, a portion of the proceeds will benefit the Philippine National Red Cross. The Philippine National Red Cross (www.redcross.org.ph) is mandated "to serve the most vulnerable individuals through its altruistic provision of services and to alleviate human suffering in moments of catastrophes and disasters."

We are providing financial support towards its efforts in providing continuous relief and rescue operations particularly in the areas of Antique, Romblon, Iloilo, Mindoro and Negros that have been placed under the state of calamity following the recent destructive upshot of supertyphoon "Frank." Fifty percent of proceeds from gala benefactors, sponsors, patrons and donors will be sent directly to the PNRC. Last year's gala raised funds which benefited four Philippine orphanages and child welfare institutions.

#### Gala Program and Tickets

The formal affair (coat and tie or barrong required) includes a sit-down dinner and an entertainment program that includes Philippine folk and contemporary dances performed by the Columbia Fil-Am Cultural Dance Troupe. The Drizzle Band will provide music for the listening and dancing pleasure of the attendees.

Tickets are \$50 per person until September 6 and \$55 per person after September 6 and at the door. Student tickets are \$35 each. Due to hotel requirements for seating and catering arrangements, we would like all guests to buy, or at least reserve, their tickets by contacting one of our officers by September 6. ## The Manila of Ropes, Paper, Folders, and Envelopes

s you know, there are A many types of merchandise that are being made in the Philippines, which make their way to stores in the U.S.A. Examples include clothing, shoes, baskets, and shell craft. You know its made in the Philippines because the label says so. However, in the cases of Manila paper, the Manila folder and the Manila envelope, the names say it all. First. Manila is the capital of the Philippines. So what makes these items so Manila?

#### Abaca

The heart of the answer is the Manila hemp plant or abaca (Musa textilis) of the family Musaceae (banana family). Abaca is native to the

Four Philippine natural tourist attractions are among the top candidates to be nominees for the New 7 Wonders of Nature.

The New7Wonders of Nature campaign seeks to "raise awareness of the incredible variety and beauty of nature around us." With the slogan "If we want to save anything, we first need to truly appreciate it!", organizers hope "these natural treasures [natural monuments, sites and landscapes] can be better preserved for future generations."

(11) Chocolate Hills — the

Philippines where it has been cultivated since the 16<sup>th</sup> century. It is not related to true hemp, but it belongs to the same genus as the common banana, which abaca closely resembles except that abaca's green fruits are inedible. These fruits appear after pollination usually by bats.

#### Manila Hemp

Manila hemp is the fiber extracted from the surface lavers of the leaf-sheaths of the abaca. Mature abaca plants are cut and its leaf-sheaths provide long fibers, which are exceptionally strong and durable. Paper-making industries prize Manila hemp for its long staple length and cellulose content. Its fiber strands are up to three meters long. Longer fibers are considered stronger than shorter ones. Manila hemp is considered the strongest of natural fibers, being three

times stronger than cotton and two times stronger than sisal fiber.


Manila hemp debuted in the Western commercial world around 1820 and was the king of marine ropes (strong, light, water resistant) prior to the introduction of synthetic fiber ropes. The coarser fibers are turned into binder twine, matting, rope, and coarse sack cloth. The finer fibers are turned into native fabric and hemp hats, bags, and other personal and household items.

#### Manila Paper

The term Manila paper refers to old Manila hemp ropes, which are turned into strong wrapping paper. Brown envelopes made from the pulp are known as Manila envelopes. The ubiquitous office folder is also known as the Manila folder.

Many specialized papers

can be produced from abaca fibers



The Philippines is the worldwide leader in abaca production and provides 85 to 90% of the worldwide requirement while Ecuador supplies the rest. The abaca fiber handicraft industry in the Philippines is thriving and is exporting its products worldwide.

So whenever you see Manila paper, Manila folders, Manila envelopes, and even the common tea bag, you can think Philippines. Abaca is another reason to be very proud of the Philippines' contribution to the world.


