FAAGC To Represent Philippines At Columbia International Festival

Once again, FAAGC will be actively involved in the 7th Annual Columbia International Festival to be held at the Cantey Building of the State Fairgrounds on April 6-7, 2002. The Association will have a Philippine country display featuring a bahay kubo; FAAGC member Merlyn Bajamunde is coordinating the cultural-educational exhibit. Helen Alon is in-charge of the Tagalog classes at the "Learn a Language" corner, a new festival attraction where visitors can learn in an hour some basic conversational phrases from one of 10 different languages. Polly Pearson will offer Philippine delicacies, gift items, and other products at her International Bazaar booth.

During the cultural entertainment program, the *Columbia Fil-Am Cultural Dance Troupe* will perform fast *tinikling*. In addition, *Hiyas-min*, the Philippine Cultural Society of Charleston, is slated to perform other Philippine folk dances. FAAGC Pioneer Selected 2002 " International Volunteer of the Year"

FAAGC pioneer and sustaining member **Grace Collins** was recently chosen as one of the two winners of the Columbia International Festival's 2002 "*International Volunteer of the Year*" award.

Her selection marks the fourth time in the seven years of the festival that a Fil-Am stalwart has been recognized. FAAGC benefactor and member **Dr. Francisco Sy**, formerly a public health professor at USC, and FAAGC past president **Nieves Austria**, math department chair at Columbia College, received the "International Professional of the Year" awards in 1997 and 2001, respectively. **Noel Alon** was named the "International Volunteer of the Year" in 1998.

Grace was cited for her "many contributions to the Filipino-American Association of Greater Columbia for over 10 years and to the Columbia International Festival committee since it began in 1996." A Fil-Am Association charter member, she served as an Executive Board member for one year (1991-92) and as Vice President for five years (1993-96, 1999-2001). Most

notably, she was the founding director of the Columbia Fil-Am Cultural Dance Troupe from 1992 to 2001.

A volunteer member of the Columbia International Festival committee since 1996, she had also helped organize programs for the *Asian-Pacific Islander Heritage* celebrations at Ft. Jackson from 1997-2000. She has "even worked with organizations outside the Columbia area in promoting Philippine culture in places such as Charleston, Charlotte and Fayetteville."

Recognition of Achievement A major highlight of the

festival, the "International of the Year" annual awards "honor and promote outstanding achievement by members of the Midlands international community." Other 2002 awardees are Tony Forker (Republic of Korea) — "International Volunteer," Dr. Prithvi Reddy (India) "International Professional" and Dr. Jeffrey Arpan (USA) "Community Ambassador." The 2002 awardees were recognized at the International Gala banquet held on March 30 at Seawell's Restaurant.

For the first time, this year's awardees were chosen by ballot by a selection committee comprised past o f "International of the Year" winners and the members of the Board of Directors of the International Friendship Ministries, the organizer of the festival. Previously, the awardees were selected by the Festival committee. According to Raj Aluri, festival director, the change was made to "allow for members of the Festival Committee to be nominated for the awards."

Do You Know Where Manila Is?

The Getty Thesaurus of Geographic Names (www. getty.edu/research/tools/ vocabulary/tgn) is a searchable world gazetteer, featuring a database of around one million place names. Search results are limited to the information on the compiled database, which is admittedly not comprehensive. However, the database continues to grow based on contributions. What where the results after searching for Manila?

I saw the expected Manila, Philippines but was surprised to see a number of locations in the USA, which were also called Manila. Although none of them were cities and were merely described as inhabited places, it was refreshing to see such a familiar name appear in so many places in the USA. This reminded me of the famous Manila folder and the Manila envelope. The Manila in these can only refer to the Manila we know as Filipinos.

Manila is in eleven US counties: Clarke, Alabama; Dallas, Alabama; Navajo, Alabama; Mississippi, Arkansas; Humboldt, California; Adams, Colorado; Johnson, Kentucky; Pettis, Missouri; McMinn, Tennessee; Daggett, Utah; and Boone, West Virginia.

The search also produced Manila Bay in the Philippines and in Ottawa, Ohio. There is a valley named Manila Canyon in both Arizona and in Placer, California. There are five instances of Manila Creek

Filipinos and others living in South Carolina who require Philippine consular services (e.g. Philippine passport renewal & changes, visa to the Philippines, etc.) should contact the

(Nome, Alaska; Southeast Fairbanks, Alaska; Iron, Michigan; Washington State; Putnam, West Virginia). There is a Manila Mine in Cochise, Arizona. There is a Manila Ridge in Putnam, West Virginia. There is a Manila Spring in Elko, Nevada. There is a stream called Manila Wash in Navajo, Arizona.

I searched the database for other Filipino cities. I found Cebu in Benton, Oregon and in our very own Horry county, South Carolina (located at latitude 33°55"N and longitude 79°01"W, just north of Conway, SC).

[Editor's note: another good site to check for geographic names is the Geographic Names Information System (GNIS) at

http://geonames.usgs.gov Developed by the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) in cooperation with the U.S. Board on Geographic Names (BGN), GNIS contains information about almost 2 million physical and cultural geographic features in the United States.

Are There Any Filipinos in Bamberg County?

According to official Census 2000 results, as of 2000, there were 1,850,314 Filipinos in the U.S. out of the total population of 281,421,906. In South Carolina, there were 6,423 Filipinos out of the 4,012,012 residents in 2000. [In the Philippines, official government census data placed the Philippine population at 76,498,735 as of May 1, 2000, with an annual growth rate of 2.34.]

As shown in the table at right (derived from the U.S. Census Bureau's Census 2000 Sum-

mary File 1 (SF 1) 100-Percent Data dataset), Filipinos live in 45 of 46 South Carolina counties, with most of the SC Filipinos in the Charleston area. But are there really no Filipinos in Bamberg county? If you know of any, let us know.

The numbers shown here reflect only those who indicated Philippines as their main national origin and may not include Filipino-Americans who put two or more races and/or national origins in the census forms.
